Rides with "Gray Lady II" A Message from the Pastor

"Gray Lady II" (my 2009 Toyota Tacoma pickup ministry partner) and, my wife I had an opportunity to go down to Los Lunas to watch our granddaughter play T-Ball. It was a trip well worth it. Those kids are a hoot to watch as they chase balls around the field that had been hit, run the bases, and of course, beat up on the poor "T" holding the ball when batting. There are two great events: watching them get better and the joy when our granddaughter runs over to us yelling grandpa and gramma.

Another happening while traveling with my wife over that trek, is my wife looking over at the Manzano mountains and with the regular curious query: "I wonder what the names are for the two peaks?" Of course, I do not know and we have not pursued it when we have gone by them. Usually, we have forgotten the question until the next time we are our driving past them. I guess that is what happens as one gets older. I am sure they have names, maybe even multiple ones from over the years and residing people.

This thought was revisited when I was reading a J. A. Vance book entitle "Downfall." The main character in this book series is a County Sheriff out of Bisbee, Arizona, named Joanna Brady. The story has a multiple murder with the victims falling off a 5,900 ft elevation peak. Where it gets interesting is that the peak has multiple names, depending on who is or has been asked. Same peak, different names. Please let me copy out for you a section on page 10 speaking to this point. "For generations of Bisbee kids, climbing that distinctive double-humped limestone peak east of town had been a rite of passage. Locals referred to it either as Geronimo or else by the name Anglo pioneers had given it—Black Knob. In official topo-map parlance, however, it was referred to as Gold Hill." She also mentioned the two humps when viewed from town looked like a valentine heart.

My hometown was named Rockford because the early settlers arriving at the east bank liked the west bank better for a variety of reasons. They forded the Rock River and named the place Rockford and also some called it Forest City because of all the trees. My last name originally when my people came to the new world was Matthieson, because the boys who made the voyage and travels were sons of Matthie. In some cases, the last names of people came from what it means in their language, like my wife's maiden name means "bright angel" or "angel of brightness".

Naming is a powerful event in peoples' lives. The process can be for signification and it can also speak of moment or presence dear to us. Like in our family for two generations all the kids first initial was the letter "D." I can not tell you why. Yet, my baby sister has the middle name "Robin." When I was little my mom told me she gave her that name because she saw a robin at the window at the hospital at the time she was giving my sister a full name.

I have spent this time on naming because many times people ask what does a name or word mean in the Bible. It should be said, especially for oral traditions similar to the early people of our Bible heritage, naming was important. It was seen as denoting a special moment where God was present or a person of God was known. It had a sense of power. Think about it today, when a person comes up to you and says your name. The relationship becomes special. There is a connection. That is why in the Old Testament you will see a lot of people and place names with "el" (hebrew for God), either in front or at the back of name. For instance, "Israel." God is present in and

remembered with designation to the son of Isaac: Jacob; or his descendants: the original twelve tribes; or later the ten northern tribes who split leaving the other two named: Judah. Naming also signified God's presence or activity in a specific time, place or person. When God made the covenant with Abram, the name was changed to Abraham and Sarai became Sarah. Their child to a very old couple brought joy to God, the parents and the future generations. His name was Isaac: "he laughs." God did what they thought could not be done. And we have Saul the great persecutor of God's people become at the Damascus Road incident where Paul began working for God and his name became: Paul.

"Zion" has a not for sure Hebrew definition but many scholars think it means "citadel." It is one of the hills at Jerusalem. Jerusalem, which became the focal site of the southern two tribes of Israel. Eventually, as you probably know, the main city of the Hebrew faith, presently. "Shekel" is measured by weight from the Babylonian weight exchange and could be a variety of metals: gold, silver, bronze and sometimes iron. It would be about 2/5 oz. Talent is about 75 lbs. The Denarius (Denarii) was the common Roman exchange coin about the size of dime and of silver. Commonly called in the King James version of the Bible: "penny."

Other asked questions about names heard from scripture are offered here next. "Ephod" was the sacred vest worn mostly by the high priests and usually made of gold, blue, purple, or scarlet. "Ebenezer" (from one of our hymns) was a memorial set up by the prophet Sanuel after the Philistines were defeated by the help of God. It means "The stone of help" with the remarks, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." (1 Samuel 7:12) Baal was the foreign god of fertility which many ascribed to in the lands about the Hebrews. "Hittites" were people who lived at the same time as the Hebrew Patriarchs tied in with the people of the northern region of Philistia. "Torah" is the first five books of the Old Testament, also called the Pentateuch. Lastly, for now, the "Samaritans" who lived and came out of the northern tribes of Israel after the death of Solomon. They considered themselves as faithful Hebrews and their holy mountain was Mt. Gerizim.
